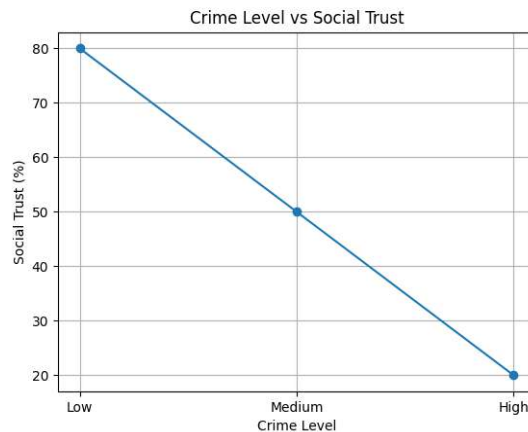
Different groups experience crime differently:

Data Analysis and Interpretation:

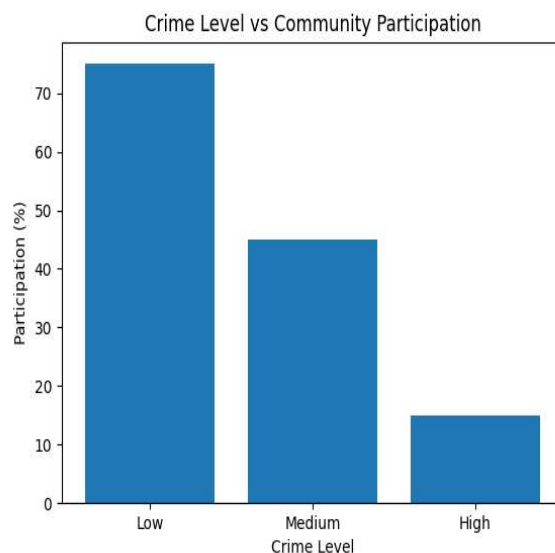
1. Crime Level vs Social Trust

The graph shows a negative relationship between crime and social trust. As crime levels increase, trust declines sharply, indicating that crime directly affects interpersonal and institutional confidence.

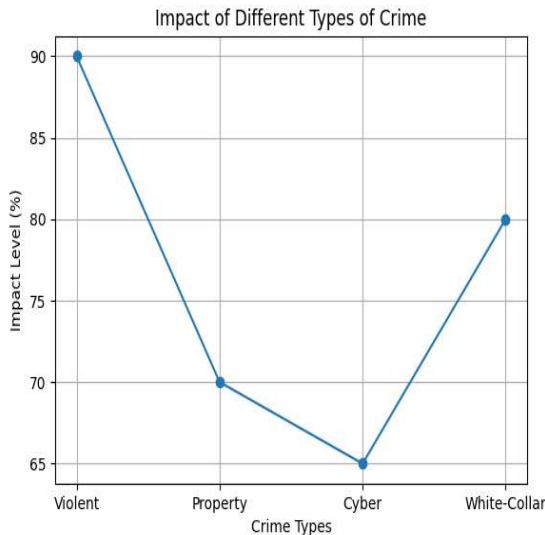
2. Crime vs Community Participation
