Impact on Traditional Rituals and Customs:

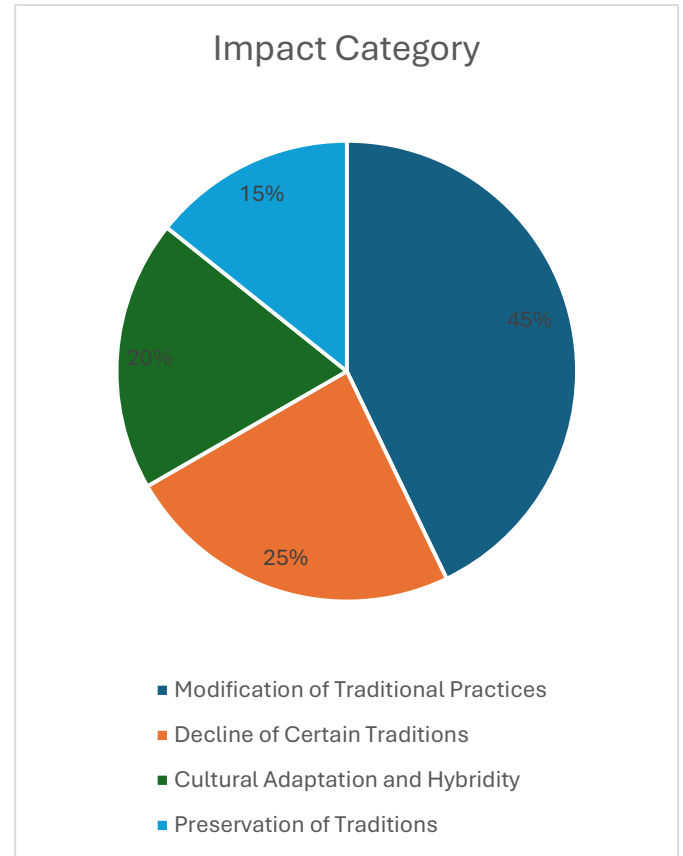
